A Typical Day in Sixth Form:


The day starts at 8:40 with form, this may be an assembly, a quiz, or a chat with our form tutor to make sure we're ready for the rest of the day.

Sixth form is a whole new chapter after GCSEs which give you the independence and work ethic you need for later on in life.


You have more freedom than year 11 and have study periods and free for independent learning.

Every year we raise money for the food bank with any lose change we have and donate various foods with the reverse advent calendar.





Progression

Module

As part of their study programme and tutorial course, all year 12 students will start 'The Progression Module' which is run in conjunction with Leeds Beckett University and works towards year 13 UCAS applications. All students will complete this during the course of the year and then attend a Graduation Ceremony in November in vear 13. We started this in 2015.

Students will complete assessed tasks in 4 key units;

- 1 You and Your Career
- 2 Exploring Your Future
- 3 Managing Your Money
- 4 Marketing Yourself

The Progression Module is designed to help Year 12 students make an informed decision about what course or career path to take. It helps students take a structured approach to researching, choosing and applying to courses in Higher Education. The module will enable students to develop skills in critical thinking, research, evaluation, interview skills and presentations.

The Progression Module is currently studied by over 2000 students across West Yorkshire, making it one of the largest schemes of its kind. Students who successfully complete the module are awarded 30 UCAS points which are recognised by Leeds Metropolitan University, the University of Huddersfield and Leeds Trinity University.

UCASThe Application to Your University Future

Students start their university applications in year 12 by completing The Progression Module. They start to research their future courses and careers and check the entry requirements for their choices match with their predicted grades.

Students will then have two weeks in July where we focus on the UCAS application and student personal statements. We will visit a UCAS fair where year 12s are able to attend seminars and lectures linked to university life, finance and their interested subject.



UNIVERSITY OF LEEDS

The University of Leeds come and speak to all year 12 students about their 'Reach for Excellence' scheme. This is an opportunity for students to apply to go on various workshops and University seminars in preparation for Higher Education.

The students need to meet certain criteria and complete an application form by November of year 12.
