Airline Pilot

Airline pilots fly passengers and cargo to destinations around the world.

How to become an Airline Pilot

You can get into this job through a university course

- applying directly
- a trainee scheme

specialist courses run by private training organisations

University

You could do a university degree in Air Transport or Aviation if you're 18 or over.

You'll usually need:

2 to 3 A levels, or equivalent, for a degree.

As well as standard university fees, you'll need to fund the flight training part of your course. Your university can advise you about this.

You'll need to have a minimum of a <u>Class 2 medical certificate</u> before you start a course.

You'll then need to apply for the higher level <u>Class 1 medical certificate</u> during your course to get your Commercial Pilot Licence. You could choose to apply for the Class 1 medical certificate before you start your course.

Cabin Crew

A flight attendant is also known as an Air Steward, Air Stewardess, or Air Cabin Crew



A flight attendant is sometimes also known as an air steward, air stewardess or air cabin crew. It is a customer-facing role that involves looking after airline passengers' health, safety and well-being while on board the flight. Flight attendants will predominately work on an aircraft during their shifts, but they may also work in offices and airports, and overnight stays in hotels are common. They will carry out many tasks, including pre - and post-flight checks, greeting passengers, checking documents, securing luggage, serving food and drinks, selling duty-free items, carrying out safety demonstrations, etc. The role may also require ad hoc administrative work, such as writing flight reports and recording items sold.

A flight attendant's main aim is to provide high-quality customer care and ensure that passengers are comfortable and have a pleasant and safe flight and get to their destination safely.

You can get into this job through

a college course

an apprenticeship

applying directly

You could do a college course like a Level 2 Certificate or Diploma in Air Cabin Crew, or study a cabin crew module part of a broader travel and tourism course.

You may need:

2 or more GCSEs at grades 9 to 3 (A* to D), or equivalent, for a level 2 course


